## **Resources for Gun Safety at Home**

Keep Children Safe at Home. Secure Your Guns. Unload guns Lock up guns Separate from ammunition

Research shows an overwhelming majority of unintentional shootings by children and teen suicides could have been prevented with secure storage. Experts agree on the following three principles:

• Unload: Gun owners should remove all ammunition from their firearms, including removing any chambered rounds.

• Lock: Unloaded firearms should be secured with a firearm locking device, such as a jacket lock, or in a locked location, like a safe or lock box. Locking devices, safes, and lock boxes are equipped with keys, combinations, or biometric technology that limit access.

• Separate: Ammunition should be stored separately from any firearms, in a secure location.

## Temporary Gun Removal is Available.

An extreme risk protective order is a court order that temporarily restricts a person's access to guns when a person poses a risk to themselves or others. Extreme risk protective orders are available to help law enforcement and concerned family members intervene quickly in dangerous situations. Under Maryland law, a person's family or household member or dating partner, a law enforcement officer, or a doctor or mental health professional who has examined the person may file a petition for an extreme risk protective order.

- A family or household member is defined as:
- Spouse,
- A person related by blood, marriage, or adoption
- Someone who has a child in common
- with the person
- Current or former legal guardian, or
- A person who lives in the same dwelling
